COOK'S CORNER #1

Raspberry Lemon Trifle

Traditionally Trifle is a Christmas dessert made with layers of pound cake, custard, fruit in juice and whipped cream. Each layer can be varied in flavour according to your specific taste.

Our family has come to enjoy this variety made with raspberries ,and lemon curd instead of custard.

1 pound cake - store bought, home made or cake mix - I use a gluten-free cake mix lemon curd - recipe to follow - made beforehand to be very cool to use raspberries - I use some frozen, some canned for the juice and some fresh for the top

1 pint whipping cream - whipped with 1/4 cup icing sugar and 1 tsp vanilla

A small amount of liqueur may be added to any layer (optional). **Note -** a small amount goes a long way. Don't overdo it.



In your fanciest bowl put a layer of cubed cake, then a layer of raspberries with some juice to soak into the cake.

Then spoon a small amount of lemon curd over cake covered with a layer of whipped cream. Repeat layers once or twice depending on the size of the bowl and the amount of dessert you are making.

You will end with a layer of whipped cream and dot with fresh raspberries and any other decoration you want.

Refrigerate several hours.

Lemon Curd (my Mother's recipe)

3 eggs 1 cup sugar

1/3 cup lemon juice Zest from one lemon

Mix well and cook on stove or in microwave stirring constantly until thickened

Mix in 1/4 cup butter.

Vanilla Pound Cake (Martha Stewart's recipe)

1 cup butter 2 cups flour 1 cup sugar 4 large eggs 2 tsp vanilla 1/2 tsp salt Beat butter and sugar, add eggs and vanilla.

Gradually add flour and salt.

Grease and flour a loaf pan and bake at 350' for about 1 hour. Lila

Remember the **Christmas Party on Saturday Dec. 2nd** at the Hal Roger's Center.


It will be a full turkey and ham dinner with all the trimmings. Doors open at 5 pm and dinner will be at 6 pm.

Vintage Winter Transportation???

Back in 1959 when I was in Grade 12 at Kam High I lived down the block from the Bedard twins, Harold and Jerald. They built a big bobsleigh. It sat 5 people and had a big old Buick steering wheel at the front. The Bedard's, Peter Howard, Hiroshi Nishimura and myself made up the 5 of us. We used to pull it from the 900 block on Nicola Street up the Rose Hill Road. There was one particular corner that was quite sharp and we often didn't make that corner, resulting with the sleigh heading off the edge of the road, into the snow while everyone bailing off, except the guy behind the steering wheel who usually didn't have time. The sleigh, of course, did not have any brakes except for the four of us behind the driver dragging our feet to slow down. My mother couldn't

understand how a new set of winter boots didn't have any tread left after one winter, and I never told her.

The Rose Hill road has now been slightly re-routed, rebuilt and paved but the famous corner still remains and can still be seen from Valleyview Drive. I must make a point of hiking up just to relive the fun we used to have.


The Mystery Car for November is a 1930 Ruxton model "A" sedan. William J. Muller came to the Edward J. Budd Mfg. Co., (who manufactured railcars, and the bodies and related parts for a lot of automobile manufacturers) as a development engineer. During his time in the racing industry, he had driven a front wheel drive car called the Goliath. He was impressed by how the car pulled you around the corners, instead of pushing you. Upon coming to Budd Mfg. Co., he brought his ideas with him for a front wheel drive car. He made a deal with Budd that if he engineered the car, that Budd would manufacture the bodies. Being from the racing industry, he was very familiar with the front wheel drive racing cars built by Harry Miller, which were winning everything during that period. The Miller design had the transmission in front of the engine, then the differential in front of that, which made for a very long unit. Muller thought he could do a new design that shortened the whole assembly, as well as put more weight over the front wheels therefore improving the cars traction. His solution was to design the front transaxle with the low gear and reverse in front of the differential, with the second high behind the differential. The crown and pinion gears were replaced by a worm gears. This shortened up the engine, transmission, and differential unit by a foot. Power was supplied by a 100 horsepower Continental straight eight, flathead engine. This engine produced a lot torque due to having a 3" bore, with long 4.8" stroke.











At this point Archie Andrews, a director as well as the major shareholder at Budd Mfg., separated the project from the Budd company, and formed New Era Motors, along with William Muller as a partner. Joesph Ledwinka with the Budd Co. designed the body Since this was a front wheel drive car, he could design the car to have a flat floor as well as a low overall height. In fact, the car was only 5 foot, 3 inches tall, 10 to 12 inches lower than automobiles produced during that period. You will notice that running boards were not required, but were standard on all the other cars of that period. The eye-catching paint finish design was by Joesph Urban, a Hollywood set designer and architect. The horizontal broad stripes of different hues emphasized how low the automobile was. Another design feather was the Woodlite headlights. They provided very poor lighting at night, so most owners either did not drive at night, or replaced them with the round headlights. They looked cool but just were not practical. Where did the Ruxton name come from? Well, Archie Andrews was talking to a New York financier by the name of William V.C.Ruxton about investing in New Era Motors, so he used the persons name for the car. Unfortunately, the investor was not impressed, so did not invest in the venture.





A deDion type front suspension was used on the front, while leaf spring s were used on the rear. Hydraulic drum brakes were used, both front and rear. A 130" wheelbase was standard.

Since Mew Era Motors did not have a manufacturing plant, and since other companies were not interested in manufacturing them under license, parts, pieces, and assemblies were assembled in different locations. Companies involved included The Board Plant, Moon automobiles, and Kissel Motors. After a very short production period New Era Motors declared bankruptcy. Unfortunately, with the effects of the depression in full swing, and the high price of this luxury car, New Era Motors failed. Only 96 cars were made, and they carried a price tag of 9 times the price of a Ford. *Art Harms*

Last Drive out of the season.



Next stop was to the "Wild Scoopz Bistro" in downtown Chase for Ice cream and gelato.






ELECTIONS Nov. 22nd
