We left for Post Falls, Idaho on August 8th for a combined *Antique Studebaker Club (ASC) and Willys Overland Knight Registry (WOKR) Tour.* There was a 1911 EMF, *1927 Dictator (ours)*, 1930 Coupe, 1938 Commander, 1941 President, 1941 Commander and a 1964 Lark (which was driven by a young member -so nice to see) which rounded out the Studebaker contingent. There was a 1923 Overland Touring, 1923 Willys Knight Roadster, 1925 Willys Knight, 1926 Willys Touring, 1926 Willys Overland Whippet, 1930 Willys and 1932 Willys as the WOKR contingent.



On Wednesday morning we toured Coeur Boat Shop. They had some

beautiful wooden boats, many under restoration.

Pretty sure that the 6 foot Chris-Craft rowboat was way out of our budget, never mind the stunning cabin cruisers and sailboats!

From there, we were off to Classic Garage Restoration where they had numerous cars Bardenay's Brew Pub/Restaurant in downtown Coeur d'Alene. There was a bit of a parking challenge as we arrived there right at lunch time. Following lunch we made a stop at Glenn Vaughn's Restoration Shop where a 1930's Packard was the current project.

Day 1 complete - 30 miles. Back at the hotel we had a tailgate dinner- actually a buffet dinner set up in the parking lot. Luckily the weather cooperated. Both ASC and WOKR had their business meetings in the

evening. Looks like we may get the two clubs together again as it was a great mix of cars and people.

Thursday morning we cruised through downtown Coeur d'Alene and turned a few heads. We followed the old Yellowstone Trail which wound through the forest above Interstate 90. We crossed over the interstate and drove Highway 97 along Lake Coeur d'Alene which is very scenic. The road is narrow, winding and had many switchbacks. A box lunch was enjoyed at the community

On that day Marg was driving our 1958 Cadillac Convertible and I had my 1939



June 9th we all met at the Kamloops Subway on Dallas Drive at 9 am-- 14 vehicles (2 of which

were modern) and 25 people: Don Potts in his 1998 Cadillac Eldorado, Harm and Deb Fransen in their modern vehicle, Bob and Michele Gieselman in their modern vehicle, Steve Bell and friend Susan Blair in Steve's 1966 Chevrolet Corvair Monza Convertible, Dave Dickinson and Sue Wilson in Dave's 1964 Ford Galaxie 500 XL 2 door hardtop, John and Lila Foley in their 1964 Chevrolet Impala 4 door hardtop, Ernie and Marg McNaughton in their 1964 Ford Mustang Convertible, Ray and Stella Rice in their 1964 Buick Riviera 2 door hardtop, Ray and Geri Henry in their 1964 Valiant Signet Convertible, Chuck Douglas in his 1965 Studebaker Cruiser 4 door sedan, Jim and Sherry Carroll in their 1973 Ford Grand Torino Wagon, Jake and Jan Surline in their 1940 Chevrolet Master 85 4 door sedan, Guy Arcand in his 1966 Ford Mustang GT Coupe, and Marlene and Craig Beddie in their 1963 Studebaker Avanti Coupe R1.

The day started as a beautiful sunny day for our day's drive to Oliver.

The route was along the backroad through Barnhartvale connecting up with highway 97, through Westwold and Falkland turning off just before Vernon to continue along Westside Road with a stop at

La Casa Market for a break and ice cream and then back onto highway 97 at West Kelowna and on to Peachland for lunch.

Most of us stopped at Gasthaus Restaurant—German cuisine. After lunch we continued on to Summerland to the Nixdorf Classic Cars

Museum. Accessible for viewing out of the collection were only about 40 vehicles. They were either 2 door hardtop or convertible classic Chevs, Fords, Olds or Chryslers. It also had a small area containing artifacts and nostalgia. An AM1 juke box was available for whoever wanted to select some songs to listen to while we wandered through. From there we

were to go to Heaven's Gate Estate Winery in Summerland

(Deb and Harm Fransen were the only ones that went to the winery and purchased some wine), and

the Cascades Casino in Penticton but time was short so most of us continued on to Tickleberry's Ice Cream shop in Ok Falls. This place not only sold a huge selection of ice cream but had a massive array of other goods available to purchase in their gift shop and Fudge Factory. Also suggested as a stop was the District Wine Village approximately 7 km from Oliver. This village consists of 12 wineries, a brewery, a distillery and a restaurant. Way too much to see for us on a tight remaining schedule.

Jake's car had to be coached to leave the winery



Our day ended registering at our accommodations at the Cactus Tree Inn and having a great dinner with excellent service at Pappa's Fire Hall Bistro. Unluckily, most of us who walked over to the Bistro, had to walk back to the motel in the rain...pouring rain, no umbrellas and for most of us, no jackets as it was so lovely walking over. Regrettably the rain was not great for sitting outside after and most of us retired early. We did have a couple of breakdowns during the day. Ray and Geri Henry's Valiant had tranny troubles about 10 km before the turnoff onto



Westside road. Because it was hot and no shade there, Lila and John Foley drove them back to Falkland to wait for the tow truck to return them to Kamloops. Foleys later caught up with the group at Nixdorf Classic Cars and the Henrys rejoined the group in the evening at the Bistro in Oliver driving their modern vehicle. Jake and Jan Surline's Chev Master had resistor trouble at La Casa. He was able to get going with assistance by Chuck Douglas and Craig Beddie and even Bob Geiselman poked his nose under the hood; Jake was able to pick up the necessary parts in Westbank and the next morning with help from Craig made the needed repairs.

Next morning, June 10, was beautiful; it smelt fresh and had clear skies. We had breakfast at M & J Country Kitchen—a short stroll from the motel. The food and service were great- a good start for the day. We left the motel after breakfast and drove about 5 minutes towards Osoyoos. We had

a choice of two wineries to visit: Gehringer Brothers Estate Winery on the right and/or Hester Creek Estate Winery which also had culinary supplies on the left. A few of our group signed up for the wine tasting and made purchases of wine. Craig and I don't drink wine, so after I had seen the culinary section and art displays at Hester Creek winery, we decided we would stop at the Home Hardware in downtown Osoyoos. Love this store. It doesn't look like a big place but it has about 5 floors and contains just about anything you could ever want. Would be a great place to do Christmas shopping as it has so much to choose from.



From Osoyoos, we headed east on Highway 3 to Greenwood. The drive over was lovely. We




made a quick stop at the viewpoint overlooking the Okanagan Valley. It gave a spectacular view. As we continued on over the summit, the scenery changed into lush green rolling hills that looked like those in pictures of Ireland. We also made a quick stop at Rock Creek's Petro-Can for gas, a bathroom break and to get some of the world famous cheese sticks and buns at their bakery. Then, just before Greenwood, the big black clouds that were gathering in the east opened up with a downpour. Ernie McNaughton said he had to stop as the Mustang's wipers could not keep up and he could not see where he was going. Stella Rice reported that when she got out of their car at Greenwood, her fit-bit fell off into the gutter and

was literally carried away with the current. She had to chase after it to retrieve it. We were about 15 to 30 minutes behind everyone and only got to experience a few rain drops; by the time we got to Greenwood, the storm had passed.

We all lunched at The Pacific Café in the old Pacific Hotel . Apparently this hotel was almost

burnt down twice and rebuilt in 1899 and 1907. And during World



War 2, the hotel was an internment building housing around 200 Japanese Canadians. This hotel was featured as the main hotel in the movie "Snow Falling on Cedars"




which debuted in 1999—a fictional drama set in 1950 era with a murder plot.

The lunch we had was

wonderful--great comfort food and wonderful friendly efficient service. Suggested while in Greenwood were visits to the Greenwood Museum which had a display of town's mining, commerce and WW11 internment camp history. The museum offered a



Greenwood Heritage Walk tour that took in the 120 year old Supreme Court Building/City Hall and prisoner's docket.

Around 6 pm we gathered for a group picture by the local paper and had dinner at the Station Pub Restaurant located in the historic Kettle Valley Railway Station building.

The food was good but they did not have enough servers for our group so it was slow. But in the end, we all eventually got our food. After dinner, we went back to the Inn and had another social/cocktail/nightcap in the parking area prior to turning in for the night.



Sunday June 11th was another sunny morning start to our day. After our continental breakfast Chuck Douglas, Guy Arcand and the Henry's left the group to get back to Kamloops. McNaughton's had a breakfast date with relatives in Grand Forks and would meet up with us later at Midway.

Around 9:30, the rest of us carried on back to Midway to the Midway Kettle River Museum. It is housed in the original 1900 or so train station building displaying artifacts and pictures of the area's cultural, railway, forestry and agricultural history and contained a gift shop. Also present on the museums grounds is a restored CPR caboose, a bunkhouse and a station house with many artifacts of the steam engine days that we were able to walk through. Out back of the main part of the museum is a covered long shed with vintage farming equipment and, of particular interest to our club's group, a 1951 Austin Fire Truck. The old track bed passes by the museum and is part of the TransCanada Trail.







After a hour and half at the museum, we continued on stopping again at Rock Creek Petro-Can and then we were off along Highway 33 to our next stop at My Neighbourhood Restaurant in Kelowna for a late lunch at one pm. This was another great choice as the food and service were very good. The Foleys left the group at this point to visit relatives in Kelowna and the rest of us headed back to Kamloops with some of us stopping in Vernon to get fuel. Unfortunately, our car—the Avanti—started acting up, sputtering and missing on the hills. As we were coming into Vernon near Polson Park, it let out a big backfire right next to some poor lady on her bicycle. We did manage to pull into the Chevron on the main throughfare, get gas and pull into one of the gas

station's parking spots to see what was wrong. Distributor problems! Luckly Craig had a spare with him and was able to change it out with some help from Jake. This took a couple of hours as the engine was pretty hot to work on. Others-- the Surlines, Rices, Gieselmans, Susan Blair and Steve Bell-- stayed with us until we were up and running and then we all headed on towards home.

It was another great adventure with lots to see and do in the 3 days.

Lila's Stawborry Shortcake



Lila has been asked for her Strawberry Shortcake recipe so here it is for you home cooks.

Ingredients

2/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup shortening

1 large egg room temperature

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 & 1/2 cups all purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 cup whole milk

1 cup heavy whipping cream, whipped

1 & 1/2 quarts fresh or frozen strawberries, sliced

Directions

- 1. In a bowl, cream sugar an shortening. Add egg and vanilla, beat well. Combine dry ingredients and add alternately with milk to the creamed mixture. Spread in a greased 9 in. square baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20—25 minutes. Cool on wire rack.
- Cut into 9 servings. Split each serving horizontally and fill with whipped cream and strawberries. Replace top of cake. Garnish with a dollop of whipped cream and more strawberries.




August Mystery Car



The August Mystery Car is a 1950 Oldsmobile. These automobiles were produced in seven different body styles, a 2 door Holiday hardtop, a two door Club coupe, a two-door sedan, a four door sedan, a four door station wagon, a two door convertible, and a sedan delivery. It must be noted that there were only seven sedan deliveries made. They were not sold to the public, but supplied to each of the separate manufacturing factory managers as all purpose vehicle. A few of them survived and are in private hands. One of the niece features of these cars was the one-piece windshield, a improvement over the two piece used previously, and still standard in the Pontiac and Chevrolet lines and that time.





The engine in these cars was the famous Oldsmobile Rocket V8. Just introduced in the Oldsmobile automobiles one year earlier, they were a huge leap ahead in technology, and widely considered the first muscle car. The main push behind these motors was Gilbert Burrell, the head of the Oldsmobile Motor Engineering Group. This modern overhead valve, short stroke V8 had a 7.25 to 1 compression ratio. Engine displacement was 303 cubic inches (five liters in today's terms) with a cylinder bore of 3.750" and a stroke of 3.430". These engines produced 135 horsepower at 3600 RPM, and 263 ft/lbs torque at 2000 RPM.



There were two transmissions that were available, a three-speed standard, and the four speed Hydramatic automatic. The Hydramatic was developed by Oldsmobile just prior the Second World War. It was the first commercially successful automatic transmission. With the successful introduction of the V8 engine, Oldsmobile was able to capitalize on the public's use of the optional transmission. Power was sent to the semi-floating rear axle. Coil springs were used for both the front and the rear suspension.

Front and rear stabilizer bars were standard, as well as dual action shock absorbers. 750 X 15 tires were mounted on 15" steel rims. The combination of the V8 engine, and the automatic transmission made these cars very popular, which created a large increase in sales. Total production for Oldsmobile in 1950 was 407,889 vehicles. *Art Harms*








STOCK CAR RACING
